I-2117 puts major Pierce & Thurston County transportation projects at risk:

- Nearly \$27 million in funding for Pierce County Transit;
- Road projects including SR 167 Completion Project, the Port of Tacoma interchange, and I-5 HOV lanes between the Tacoma Mall and Joint Base Lewis-McChord;
- Fife to Tacoma Pedestrian Access project to build a nonmotorized path from Downtown Tacoma to the Puyallup Riverwalk Trail;
- Adding 43 public electric vehicle charging stations across Thurston County; and,
- Zero-emission shore power projects at the Port of Tacoma to reduce air quality impacts of idling vessels.





I-2117 cuts funding for wildfire resilience and prevention programs that make forests healthier and communities safer:

- Grants to **help landowners in high-risk areas to prepare for wildfires** by implementing proactive safety measures; and,
- **Restoring forestlands** that have the greatest potential to prevent wildfires and protect air quality.

I-2117 would gut vital planned protection to waterways:

- Cuts funding for four **fish barrier removals** on Percival Creek and Beatty Creek at Chelsie Lane;
- The restoration of the Deschutes Estuary; and,
- Complete implementation of shoreline armor removal on Henderson Bay in Pierce County and restoring shoreline and forests at Still Harbor.
